forts to improve student success through collaboration and instructional reform. It reflects the work of teachers, staff, and leadership at both Sierra Vista and Washington elementary schools and serves as a model for campuses across California.

Sierra Vista Principal Jamie Huerta praised her staff for their dedication and the transformation of the school's culture.

"We have turned things around in a way I never thought possible. If you had asked me three years ago if we'd be in the place that we are in now, I would have said 'absolutely not,'" Huerta said. "But this award represents the hard work of our teachers, our staff, and the school community. The level our teachers' collaborate is entirely different then it was just three years ago. This award is definitely well deserved. I keep telling them, next stop is Model PLC.

Sierra Vista's path to earning the recognition involved it's that hard to do what you
